Tusculum College's 2004 "Theologian-in-Residence" lecture series.

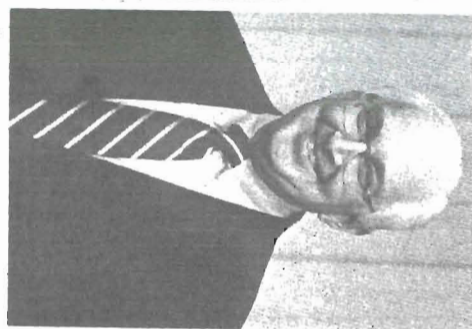
Leading the annual series will be Dr. Joseph D. Small, coordinator of the Office of Theology and Worship, and associate director of

Congregational Ministries Division of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

Now in its 14th year, the popular series, sponsored by the College and Holston Presbytery, will feature sessions exploring various facets of ministry. Sessions are held on each Tuesday in February. The sessions begin at 10 a.m., breaking for lunch at 12:15 p.m. The group reconvenes for an afternoon wrap-up session at about 1 p.m. The first week's session on Feb. 3 will focus on "The State of Ministry." On Feb. 10, "The Marks of Ministry" will be the topic. "The Shape of Ministry" will be the focus of the third session on Feb. 17. The series will conclude Feb. 24 with a discussion of "The Future of Ministry."

His position with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and his past experience gives Dr. Small a wealth of knowledge to share. He directs the work of the Office of Theology and Worship and its staff of eight theologians and liturgists.

Earning a doctorate of ministry degree in theology from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Dr. Small also holds a master's degree of theology (New Testament) from Princeton Theological Seminary, and a master's degree of divinity from the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. He also holds a degree in political science from Brown University.

Dr. Small is the author of "Fire and Wind: The Holy Spirit in the Church Today" (2002), "Committed Conversation" (2000), and "God and Ourselves: A Brief Exercise in Reformed Theology" (1996). He has written numerous journal articles, study series, and theological papers. He also serves on the board of the Lilly Endowment-funded "Pulpit & Pew" project that is studying pastoral leadership in American Christianity.
